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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

During the reporting period of July to December 2025, Hunar Ghar successfully trained 131 marginalized women and girls from economically disadvantaged communities in Lucknow in comprehensive stitching and tailoring skills. The program achieved a 70% completion rate, with 17 beneficiaries securing employment or starting their own tailoring enterprises.

KEY HIGHLIGHTS

- 131 women enrolled across 02 batches
- 78 trainees successfully completed the full course
- 46 women placed in employment or self-employed

Target Beneficiaries

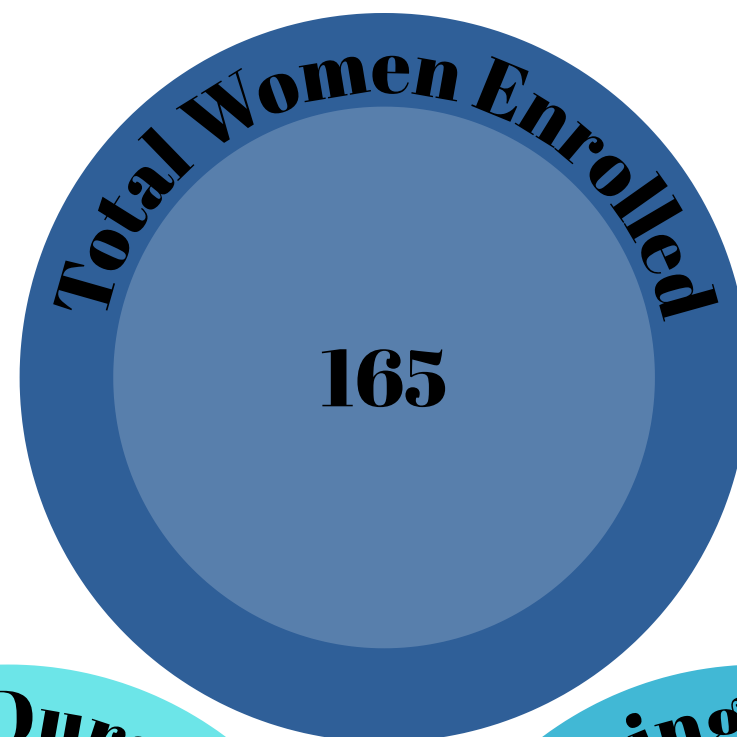
- Women and girls from marginalized communities in Lucknow

Key Highlights

- Initial Cohort: 15 dedicated beneficiaries enrolled in the first phase.
- Skill Development: Comprehensive training covering foundational stitches (Bakhiya, Phanda, and Keel Kanta etc.)
- Economic Impact: Designed to connect local artisans directly with contemporary markets.
- Empowerment Goal: Transforming a traditional art form into a viable source of monthly income for marginalised households.
